

Beginner Fishing Trip Checklist

1. Rules Before Gear

- Choose the exact province, territory, park, lake, river or tidal water you plan to fish.
- Buy the correct recreational fishing licence before fishing.
- Check open season, catch limit, possession limit, size limit and bait restrictions.
- Save a digital or printed copy of your licence and regulations summary.
- If fishing coastal or tidal water, verify whether a separate federal or tidal licence applies.

2. Simple Beginner Gear

- One 6 ft 6 in to 7 ft medium-light or medium spinning rod.
- One 2500-size spinning reel with 6 to 10 lb line.
- Small hooks, split shot, floats, swivels and a few simple jigs.
- Small spoons, inline spinners and soft plastics for casting practice.
- Needle-nose pliers, line clippers, tape measure and small net.
- Weather layer, hat, sunglasses, sunscreen, water and snacks.

3. Pick One Easy Target

- Panfish for family trips and fast action.
- Stocked trout for ponds and small lakes.
- Bass for shoreline casting and structure practice.
- Pike only if you bring pliers and a stronger leader.
- Avoid chasing advanced trophy species on your first trip.

4. Choose Easy Access Water

- [] Start with a legal public dock, stocked pond, park shoreline, fishing pier or slow riverbank.
- [] Check signs for closed areas, private property, sanctuary zones or boating restrictions.
- [] Fish a two-hour morning or evening session instead of forcing a full-day trip.
- [] Bring a simple map or phone location pin for parking, trailhead and exit route.

5. Fish Handling

- [] Wet your hands before touching fish you plan to release.
- [] Keep fish low and close to the water while removing hooks.
- [] Measure fish quickly if you might keep it.
- [] Release fish immediately if the size, season or limit is not legal.
- [] Use pliers for toothy fish and cut the line if a hook is deeply swallowed.

6. After the Trip

- [] Write down date, water, weather, lure or bait, depth and any fish activity.
- [] Fix one skill next time: knots, casting, lure speed, location choice or fish handling.
- [] Rinse gear, dry tackle, dispose of line safely and pack out all waste.
